Jewel of the Creative Market celebrates 17 years

Yannis from Ocean Inlays notched up 17 years at the May Creative Market. The beginning of Ocean Inlays was seeded in 1998 when Yannis, living in Takaka at the time, made a ring. He then learned bone carving under the infamous Chris Bones, aka Bones. It was here that the inlay technique spoke to him. By the time he was 19, Yannis was supplying galleries around the country, including Te Papa in Wellington. The jeweller has been handcrafting unique, multimedia necklaces, bracelets and rings ever since."I meet locals now who are still wearing the old turquoise necklaces," he says. He moved to Raglan from Golden Bay those many years ago with his partner Monika. "It was meant to

be; we did our first market, pregnant with our first child, then found a home and a welcoming community – and creative market." Yannis says the success of the markets is thanks to the organisers over the years. "A lot of credit to our maunga (mountain) and a big thank you to the Old School and to Deb for hosting the markets."
