Back in 2002, when we first moved to Raglan Whāingaroa, my friend Ray from New Jersey visited us. I'd been telling him about Raglan Whāingaroa, the surfing, the arts and the orcas in the harbour. While in town he purchased a surf board and he asked to see the orcas. I told him that he couldn't see any orcas as they only visited once a year. He said what about the arts, is that only once a year as well?

At that time most artists kept to their studios. There was an exhibition in the town hall every year or so. The Old School was rented to a tertiary institute for their classes.



After a successful career as a corporate manager followed by international business consulting work, I was after a new challenge. I decided to focus on the heritage and arts in Raglan Whāingaroa. The physical visible results of my work are the new museum, conservation of the Old School, plus two new large buildings at the back of the Old School, including a purpose-built clay shed. Unseen by most people are the cloud-based accounting, constituent, web and general computer systems that enable all of the creative activities to happen efficiently. These all contribute to the result that under my leadership the Old School has established a strong reputation as a fiscally well-run community creative hub. A few years ago, my volunteering was recognised with the Volunteer of the Year Award. In the last year my personal work on applications resulted in successful grants of over \$100,000. In addition, an LTP application resulted in a magnificent rebuilt car park and much needed storm water drainage. Our funding successes come from funders knowing that we are a well-run financially savvy organisation to the extent that other charitable organisations now approach us for help in securing funds.

For the arts, Raglan Whāingaroa now has a thriving successful community multi-arts centre. I founded the Raglan Film Festival and integrated the Creative Market into Old School activities. Major events such as Raglan Arts Weekend, Raglan Art to Wear, and Whāingaroa Writers World are run by the Raglan Community Arts Council.

Over the next year I will finish the Creative Space building, making the cinema operational in Whare Tapere, completing the security camera project and building an additional accessible toilet. Work will continue on improving the effectiveness of the newly formed sponsorship sub-committee which is a critical part of fund-raising. Recently approval was given by the RCAC committee for preparation of a position paper on the future direction of the Film Festival. The Arts Weekend continues to grow financially and in breadth across a number of options. The new complementary Country and Blues Festival expands the opportunities even further.

In terms of what I will bring to the role my achievements speak for themselves. The role of Chairperson is a mixture of governance, management and volunteering. My two decades in the local arts community has allowed me to build an extensive network in Raglan. If re-elected, in terms of management I will continue work to fund-raise in an increasingly tight financial environment, make the Creative Market self-sufficient, and operate Raglan Movies at the Old School with its large volunteer group.

My skills, knowledge and network are what is needed to continue developing Raglan Whāingaroa as a thriving hub for arts, culture and creativity.
